





## **CLOSED ADOPTION**

Occasionally, birth parents will request a closed adoption. The agency will then choose the best adoptive parents for the baby from among the approved and waiting families. In a closed adoption there is typically little or no information exchanged.

## **ANONYMOUS SURRENDER**

In Michigan, the Safe Delivery of Newborns law allows for anonymous surrender of a newborn by his or her parent. Most often, the baby goes immediately to an already-approved adoptive family in Michigan. This law is meant to provide safety for a baby who might otherwise be abandoned.

## More on Openness in Adoption

Research has supported that open adoptions are generally good for adopted children, birth parents, and adoptive parents.

There is no single, easily defined idea of an open adoption. It typically includes the opportunity for birth and adoptive families to meet and make a plan for ongoing contact throughout the child's life.

At Adoption Associates, we most commonly arrange <u>semi-open adoptions</u>, which involve meeting in person, possible continued contact throughout the pregnancy, and an agreement to exchange pictures and letters. This communication can be facilitated by the agency, done through non-identifying emails, or can be more direct, such as texting or messaging.

A more open adoption might include exchanging identifying information and planning for regular visits. Families communicate directly and plan visits together as the child grows up.

## ADVANTAGES FOR THE CHILD

- More access to information about the birth family, including health and background information
- The adoptive family is better able to answer the child's questions about their adoption and history
- The opportunity to have ongoing contact with birth parents provides adopted children with a greater sense of identity, as well as an understanding of their adoption story
- > With direct contact, the child does not have to wonder about their birth parents but instead knows true and accurate information about them

## ADVANTAGES FOR BIRTH PARENTS

- > By choosing and meeting the adoptive parents, there is a greater sense of security for the birth parents in making their adoption plan
- Receiving pictures and letters provides reassurance to the birth parents and confidence that the child is being well cared for in the adoptive family
- ➤ Choosing the adoptive family is empowering to birth parents in their adoption process
- ▶ By seeing the child grow and develop, as well as the opportunities the adoptive family is able to provide, birth parents are better able to deal with the loss and grief they may feel and experience less negative feelings or guilt

## ADVANTAGES FOR ADOPTIVE FAMILY

- Meeting birth parents helps the adoptive family learn about them and their adoption decision and provides the family with information to share with the child about their adoption story
- ➤ Greater understanding and knowledge of health and background information can be obtained
- > Building a relationship based on a mutual desire for the best interest of the child helps everyone feel more secure in the plan for adoption





# A step by step guide to agency-matched adoption \*

## **DECISION-MAKING**

Decide if a private adoption is right for you. You may have already experienced infertility, explored other options to becoming parents, or even considered a life without children. But now you're considering adoption. This may not have been your first choice, but before proceeding, we believe you must fully accept that it is now the best choice.

Or maybe you're already parents, and want to grow your family through adoption now. It's important to personally identify your reasons before starting this life-changing process.

## CONTACT AN AGENCY

Select a reputable, licensed child-placing agency that is responsive to your needs, makes you feel comfortable, and answers all your questions. Adoption Associates provides the full spectrum of adoption services, both for you, the adoptive couple, as well as for the birth parents.

#### APPLICATION AND HOME STUDY PROCESS

With Adoption Associates, you'll start by having an individual consultation and you'll then attend an agency orientation meeting. The formal application and home study process comes next. You'll have a series of interview meetings with a caseworker who then writes a full assessment of your background, your preparation for adoption, and the suitability of your home. We'll also collect medical reports, background clearances, reference letters, and we'll complete a review your finances.



## CREATING A PROFILE AND AWAITING A MATCH

Once you have an approved home study, you will be guided through the creation of a profile. This is a book of pictures and information about you, which we will share with expectant parents. Whenever we have an expectant parent we're working with who's confident of her decision of adoption, we'll show her the profiles of waiting families who best fit her situation. It's usually just a matter of time before each of our waiting families is matched through this process.

## BEING MATCHED AND PLANNING FOR OPENNESS


Once an expectant parent chooses an adoptive couple, one of the typical next steps is planning for an open adoption relationship that is unique to everyone's desires and needs. The Adoption Associates caseworker expertly guides you through this process.

## COMPLETE THE LEGAL PROCESS

Once the baby is born, Adoption Associates facilitates the legal aspects of the adoption. The baby MAY go straight home from the hospital with the adoptive parents, but it is also common for the baby to come into temporary agency host care. Either way, one of the very next steps is scheduling a court hearing for the birth parents. Following this hearing, during which the birth parents sign a release of parental rights, the adoption petition is filed. If the baby is not already in the care of the adoptive couple, this is the time when he or she is transferred to them. Adoption Associates then supervises the placement for a minimum of three months, after which the adoption is final. The child is now a permanent member of the adoptive family.

The overall time frame varies from case to case. Give us a call and we'll be happy to share details on current wait times and trends.

# ADVANTAGES FOR EXPECTANT PARENTS IN WORKING WITH AN AGENCY

## Counseling

The caseworkers at Adoption Associates understand the feelings, fears, and questions of birth parents. They'll talk honestly about options and provide resources to help make the best decision. The caseworker works closely with the birth parent to fully understand adoption, to help find the ideal adoptive family, to determine the amount of openness desired, to prepare for labor and delivery, and to provide steadfast emotional support.

## **FINANCIAL SUPPORT**

Adoption Associates is uniquely skilled and experienced when it comes to providing appropriate financial support for birth parents, recognizing that not every case will require such support. The Michigan Adoption Code allows an adoptive family to help with reasonable pregnancy-related expenses during pregnancy and for up to six weeks after delivery.

## **TRANSPORTATION**

Adoption Associates staff can assist with transportation to appointments, or can help access available community resources. We can also assist with locating housing resources as needed, and help meet more emergent needs as well.

## MEDICAL CARE

- ➤ Is he or she reputable, licensed, and experienced in adoption?\*
- ➤ Will he or she support and care for everyone involved in the adoption?\*\*
- ➤ What kind of counseling is offered to expectant parents?
- ▶ Is he or she going to help with each step of the adoption process?
- ▶ Will he or she help figure out just the right level of openness in adoption?
- ▶ What kind of post-adoption support does he or she offer?
- > Will he or she be able to provide ALL services, or will you be left on your own to figure some things out?
- ➤ How supported and cared for will you be if things go wrong?
- ▶ How well do you understand ALL of the fees involved?
  - \*using ONLY a facilitator is illegal in Michigan
  - \*\*One attorney cannot represent both parties in an adoption

Adoption is SO MUCH MORE than just a legal process! Expectant parents, adoptive parents, and adopted babies and children can ONLY be expertly, fully, and uniquely cared for by a reputable, licensed agency.





## HOW LONG WILL IT TAKE TO ADOPT?

Most families waiting with Adoption Associates have a successful placement within 18 months of completion of their home study and profile. Birth parents generally want to select and meet the family they have chosen, so you will need to wait for the birth parent who decides that you can offer the family and future she wants for her baby. Applicants open to adopting children of any race, situations with substance exposure for the infant, or greater degrees of openness will usually have a shorter wait.

## What kind of costs are involved in a domestic adoption?

You can expect to pay for things like the homestudy, birth parent expenses, legal fees, adoption service fees, outreach and education fees, and travel expenses. A detailed fee schedule is available, and you will have plenty of opportunity to fully understand and anticipate the applicable fees.

## ARE THERE FINANCIAL RESOURCES TO HELP ME ADOPT?

There is currently a Federal Tax Credit available for most domestic adoptions. You can learn more about the federal tax credit eligibility and benefits through the IRS website. There are also a growing number of employers that offer adoption reimbursement. Check with your employer to find out if your company offers such benefits. Further, many adoptive couples seek grant-funding, crowd-funding, or adoption loans.

## What birth parent information will we receive?

Adoption Associates will obtain as much information as possible about the birth parents' health history and background. We also seek a release from the birth mother to obtain her prenatal medical records if available. We will share all information obtained with the prospective adoptive parents, as well as information received from the hospital regarding delivery and newborn medical care.

## What are some of the characteristics of birth mothers who are working with Adoption Associates?

Women who are serious about adoption planning are often in their twenties, but can range in age from young teen to middle age. They probably didn't intend to get pregnant. They could be married, single, divorced, or in a domestic partnership. We work with women of all different races and backgrounds. Many have children they are currently parenting. Some might be homeless, abused, have unsupportive families, using drugs or struggling with mental health challenges. Each woman has a unique situation and personality, but they all share the love that they have for their child and courage to give their baby the best future possible.

## CAN THE BIRTH PARENTS COME BACK TO TAKE THE CHILD?

Birth parents typically voluntarily release their parental rights in court prior to the legal adoption. The termination of their parental rights is a final decision. However, prior to the termination by court, the birth mother may change her mind about her adoption plan and choose to parent instead. Once the court hearing is complete though, she can no longer change her mind.

## Does the birth father have any rights?

The birth father's rights must also be considered when planning adoption. Adoption Associates will work with the court to determine if his rights can be terminated if he disagrees with the adoption, or if the birth mother no longer has a relationship with him.

## CAN WE WORK WITH ADOPTION ASSOCIATES EVEN IF WE DONT LIVE IN MICHIGAN?

Adoption Associates is able to facilitate an adoptive placement in Michigan for couples from other states. If you do not live in Michigan, you will need to obtain a home study from an agency in your state, but the rest of the adoption process will be facilitated for you by Adoption Associates.

#### **AGENCY POLICIES**

Appendix to Program Statement

#### **ADOPTION ELIGIBILITY**

This agency seeks to advance the welfare of children throughout the adoptive placement process. Therefore, the agency will employ the following adoptive parent eliqibility criteria:

Heterosexual couples who have been married for at least one year are eligible for domestic adoption and international home study. Single heterosexual women are eligible for international adoptive home studies. The sexual orientation of applicants will be assessed during the adoptive home study.

The agency will deny applications of persons:

- who have been divorced more than two times
- whose sexual orientation is other than heterosexual
- who are not married and are cohabitating with another person of the opposite gender
- who have been convicted of a felony
- who have any pending criminal charges
- who have any substantiated abuse or neglect charges
- who abuse alcohol or other substances

The agency reserves the right to deny applications of persons:

- who have any misdemeanor convictions
- who have been accused of abuse or neglect
- who have a significant medical condition
- · who exhibit any behaviors, past or present, that are assessed to be detrimental to the well-being of the child or the family unit

#### ADOPTION SERVICES PROVIDED TO PROSPECTIVE ADOPTIVE FAMILIES

- Orientation Prospective adoptive parents complete the Domestic Adoption Awareness orientation (DAA) after submitting their
  preliminary application and attending an initial consultation. After attending DAA, prospective adoptive parents sign a statement
  confirming they have received orientation. Orientation occurs before the Domestic Infant Adoption Formal Application contract is
  completed.
- Training A minimum of 12 hours of home study education/training is required. Training requirements are discussed during DAA and assigned to prospective adoptive parents by their home study caseworker. A record of education/training completed is held in the family file.
- Adoptive home study evaluation and recommendation A caseworker completes a home study with prospective adoptive parents. A
  printed report including the agency recommendation and all supporting documentation is held in the adoptive family file. The home
  study process is discussed with prospective adoptive parents during DAA.
- Grievance Policy The agency has a formal grievance policy. Prospective adoptive families receive a copy of the Grievance Policy and Grievance Form with their DAA materials.
- Adoptive family profile services Prospective adoptive parents are assisted by their caseworker and a team of professionals when
  compiling their profile. Completed profiles are shown to potential birth mothers.
- Adoptive placement services The agency works with birth mothers and prospective adoptive parents to legally place a child into an
  approved adoptive family's home.
- Adoption legal paperwork The agency completes all legal paperwork required by courts in the State of Michigan to process adoptions through to finalization.
- Post placement supervision and monitoring with reports The agency completes required post placement monitoring along with written
  reports for the county court where the adoption is being processed. Copies of post placement reports are kept in the adoptive family
  file.

#### **CHILD SPACING**

The agency requires that the placement of a child(ren) in an adoptive home provide at minimum a nine month age range between the adopted child and the other children in the home, and that the age of the child being placed be under the youngest child currently in the home. The purpose of this is to preserve the birth order, assure differential grade placements in their schooling, and minimize comparison and competition between



siblings. Likewise, when adopting more than one child, unrelated adopted children and the existing children in the home must be at least nine months apart in age. The decision to place a child with a family not meeting the child spacing policy will be made according to the professional judgment of agency staff.

#### SUBSEQUENT (ADOPTIONS)

AAI requires that each adoptive family allow a transition time of one year between the placement of an adopted child or birth of a biological child into the home before adding another child to the family. We recognize that circumstances for each family situation are different and so encourage you to consult with your caseworker as to the right timing for you to begin the application process. Your caseworker will be a valuable resource in assessing your family's transition and readiness to proceed with a subsequent adoption.

#### HOME STUDY/HOME STUDY UPDATES/HOME STUDY ADDENDUMS

All home studies, updates, and addendums must be completed by a licensed adoption agency in the family's state of residence. If this agency completed the family's original home study, the agency will complete the home study update. The family will need to obtain new clearances, medicals, reference letters, and any other materials asked for by their home study caseworker. A visit with all family members in the home will also be required. Please see the fee schedule for applicable fees. If the family's home study was completed by a different agency, the family will be responsible for contacting their home study agency to complete the update and will be responsible for all costs incurred.

In the event that a significant change occurs in the family's life, or if the family wishes to be approved for, or the agency wishes to approve the family for a child with different characteristics than stated in the original home study, a home study addendum will be required. If this agency completed the family's original home study, then we will complete the home study addendum. If there is a new member of the household, the caseworker will visit all members of the household and the family must obtain a medical for the new household member, as well as a clearance if the new household member is over age 18. In the event of a change of residence, the caseworker will visit all members of the household at the new residence. When a job change has occurred, the caseworker will speak with the family by phone and the family provide the agency with a letter from the new employer. The agency may require additional documentation or visits with the family at the agency's own discretion and will charge the family for addendums completed as a result of a change initiated by the family. If the family's home study was completed by a different agency, the family will be responsible for contacting their home study agency to complete the addendum and will be responsible for all costs incurred.

If using this agency for a home study only, all home study services will be billed according to applicable fee schedules, including all updates and addendums.

Adoption Associates, Inc. will not complete a home study for families seeking an independent adoption. Families seeking an international home study must also be contracted with a U.S. placing agency.

#### **MEDICAL CARE**


The agency will place children only into homes with parents who agree to seek medical attention when necessary for the child. In addition, parents must agree not to withhold medical treatment for the child against the advice of medical personnel.

#### **DISCIPLINE POLICY**

The agency will thoroughly assess the prospective adoptive parent's approach to child discipline as part of the home study process. There is substantial and compelling research to indicate that corporal punishment generally has a negative and harmful impact on children. Alternately, there are positive and affirmative forms of discipline that should be utilized instead. The agency will provide educational resources to prospective clients as requested and when concerns arise. The agency reserves the right to deny approval of the client's home study if the parents' approach to child discipline is deemed inappropriate by the agency.

#### **NON-DISCLOSURE POLICY**

This agency takes nondisclosure of arrests, convictions, unsubstantiated/substantiated incidents of child abuse or neglect, and significant medical issues very seriously. If the prospective client does not disclose said issues on the formal application, this could result in possible denial of the application or rescission of the adoptive home study—if already completed.





The agency understands and acknowledges prospective adoptive clients may be apprehensive to disclose such incidents, but a criminal record, including an expunged record, will almost certainly be discovered through required state and FBI background checks. Medical issues can be discovered by required forms from the client's doctor. If these issues are not disclosed to the agency by the prospective adoptive client, it can result in feelings of mistrust between agency and client.

Disclosure of incidents can save time by allowing the agency to direct prospective clients away from programs who may not be accepting of even seemingly minor criminal or medical issues. Disclosure allows the agency to inform prospective clients about additional documentation that may be required to provide to the court or cooperative agency. This can save valuable time for the client and the agency.

In the event that a prospective adoptive parent, immediate family member, or resident of the home is arrested, convicted of a crime, accused of child abuse or neglect, or diagnosed with a significant medical issue during the adoption process, such incidents or issues must be disclosed to the agency within 24 hours.

In the event that a significant change takes place in the household, including but not limited to, a new household member or change in employment, disclosure to the agency is required within 24 hours.

The ultimate determination to either terminate, hold, or continue the case will be made by the administration of the agency after review is completed of each case, taking into consideration the circumstances that are cause for concern regarding the best interest of the child and/or family. Several issues will be considered, to include, but not limited to: severity of the incident, length of time that has passed since the incident happened, circumstances surrounding the incident, rehabilitation, and lifestyle changes.

In the event that the agency terminates a case, the client must agree to fully cooperate with the agency to ensure that any child matched to or placed with the prospective adoptive family is allowed the opportunity to be adopted by another prospective family.

#### **PREGNANCY**

#### **Domestic Adoption Program**

With the best interest of the family in mind, prospective adoptive couples who become pregnant during their adoption process will stop their adoption process at that time. Services for any portion of a home study/update, agency services, or post adoption supervision terminated prior to completion will be billed on a pro-rated basis. Payments for services not yet performed will be refunded, excepting the non-refundable fees. The timing of when the couple can pursue the agency's adoption program should be discussed with the administration, always taking into consideration the Child Spacing policy; the clinical advisability of proceeding with adoption placement plans; the ages of the children involved; and the family's wishes.

#### **International Home Study Only Services**

AAI requires disclosure to the prospective adoptive couple's home study caseworker when a pregnancy occurs at any time up to the time of placement and/or finalization.

#### **FEE AND REFUND POLICY**

The agency has made a good faith effort to provide a comprehensive schedule of adoption fees. However, the agency cannot guarantee the final amount of a family's adoption fees and expenses. All fees, including agency, state, and third party fees, are subject to change during the adoption process. Prospective adoptive parents are required to pay the fees according to the fee schedule in effect when the fee is invoiced (if invoiced by AAI) or when the fee becomes due (for those fees which are not invoiced by AAI).

Fees are charged based on both direct and indirect services provided. All or a portion of a fee may be due prior to completion of a specific service. Any portion of a fee that is not paid prior to completion of a service will be due in full upon completion of that service. If payments are not received as scheduled, adoption services may be suspended until outstanding balances have been paid. Failure to pay outstanding balances for an extended period of time may result in the case being closed.

In the event that either the agency or the county/state is unable to complete your adoption process, or if the prospective adoptive parents choose to withdraw from an adoption program, the following refund policy will apply:

- 1. All fees payable to AAI are nonrefundable once they are paid.
- 2. Fees paid directly to third parties are nonrefundable by the agency.

AAI Administration reserves the right to make exceptions to the refund policy in the event that such exceptions would benefit prospective adoptive parents. Refunds to which prospective adoptive parents are entitled will be provided within sixty days of the completion of the delivery of services.



## PROGRAM STATEMENT

Adoption Associates, Inc. (AAI), founded in 1990 and fully licensed through the State of Michigan, is a leading Michigan agency in private infant adoptive placements. Agency professionals are skilled and experienced at combining the tested and safe methods of agency adoption with the successful outreach methods of private adoption as practiced today in most states. Client participation in the process is a key to success. Birth parents expect to be very involved in planning adoption for their babies. Likewise, adoptive families are encouraged to take an active role in their adoption process. AAI heartily supports this approach as being in the best interests of everyone involved – first children, but also birth and adoptive parents.

Both agency-matched and designated adoptions are promoted and facilitated at AAI. In designated adoptions the adoptive parents take an active role in their adoption process, resulting in birth parents responding directly to adoptive parents as a result of their networking efforts. The role of AAI includes first educating adoptive families on how to reach birth parents, and then facilitating the placement. The adoptive home study, required birth parent counseling, required post placement supervision, and all legal services are delivered efficiently and economically from one source - Adoption Associates, Inc. In addition, AAI is innovative and effective in reaching out to prospective birth parents. Our commitment to meeting their real needs and involving them in planning their adoptions is another reason for our success.

Adoption Associates is experienced and licensed to provide both domestic and international adoptive home studies in Michigan. International adoptive home studies are written to comply with Michigan, USCIS and foreign country requirements. When working with AAI for International Home Study only, prospective adoptive parents must also work with a licensed U.S. placing agency who is willing to oversee or supervise the international home study process.

#### TYPES OF CHILDREN PLACED BY AAI:

- 1. Children of all races
- 2. Newborns and infants less than one year of age
- 3. Older children privately released for adoption
- 4. Children with medical and developmental special needs

#### **SELECTION OF ADOPTIVE PARENTS:**

- 1. Birth parent selection from adoptive profiles
- 2. Birth parent and adoptive family identify one another (designated adoption)
- 3. Agency determines placement at the request of birth parent and in Safe Delivery cases

#### **TYPES OF PLACEMENTS:**

- 1. Agency-matched placements
- 2. Designated placements
- Private adoptions (includes all standard AAI services such as home study, birth parent counseling, representation of birth parents and/or adoptive parents, domestic adoption legal paperwork/services, and post adoption supervision)
- 4. Transracial adoption
- 5. Interstate placements
- 6. Children for placement who are released under Michigan's Safe Delivery law
- 7. Special needs home studies and placements
- 8. Guardianships converted to adoptions

#### **EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION:**

- 1. Birth parent choice
- 2. Semi-open: parties exchange non-identifying information such as first names, email address, phones numbers, and pictures and letters after placement
- 3. Full disclosure open: parties exchange identifying information including last names and contact information
- 4. Closed: parties do not exchange any information when a child is released under Michigan's Safe Delivery law, or at birth parent request

#### **ELIGIBILIY:**

- 1. Heterosexual married couples
- 2. Single heterosexual female applicants accepted for international home study services

#### AREA SERVED:

- 1. Michigan statewide
- 2. Any other state in the U.S. for placement-only services
- 3. Internet inquiries

#### **SERVICES PROVIDED:**

- 1. Information: group meetings and private consultations, electronic materials, printed materials
- 2. Pre-home study consultation on adoption options, issues, and proposed private placements
- 3. Adoptive home study: with emphasis on preparation for successful adoptive parenthood; compliance with Michigan and international regulations
- 4. Birth parent counseling and support groups prior to and following release of parental rights
- 5. Agency/Administrative services: direct and indirect services necessary for the continuation of domestic programs, agency administration, and internal operations which enable AAI to complete placements on behalf of adoptive families. The following are examples of, but are not limited to, expenses incurred in providing these services: Compliance with state and federal regulations. Travel, communication, and consulting with birth parents and with prospective adoptive parents. Administrative expenses including employee compensation and training, agency legal services, insurances, and professional/contractual services. Operational expenses including facilities, utilities, equipment, supplies, outreach and advertising
- 6. AAI provides trainings and in-services/workshops to hospitals, physician's offices, crisis pregnancy centers, schools, social workers, and other related entities
- 7. Legal facilitation: coordination of all legal arrangements for domestic adoptions
- 8. Interstate facilitation: coordination of interstate procedures and arrangements for domestic adoptions
- 9. Guidance and support through the waiting period. Special programs, meetings, and support groups for waiting families may be offered
- Referral for counseling and other services to children being released for adoption, based on the needs of the child
- 11. Post placement/post adoption supervision: completion of mandated visitations and reports and continuing counseling as needed
- 12. Post legal services: counseling resources for children, birth parents and adoptive parents
- 13. Various pre and post placement events and activities for both potential and actual adoptive families
- 14. Post-finalization services to adoptive parents and/or biological parents by referral upon the request of the involved parties

#### TRAINING REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Families receiving a domestic home study must complete a minimum of 12 hours of training on topics detailed in the Domestic Pre-Adoption Training Requirements document
- 2. Families receiving an international home study must complete a minimum of 12 hours of training on topics detailed in the International Pre-Adoption Training Requirements

#### **FEES**

- 1. Standardized fees for consultation, home study, post placement/post adoption services, agency fee, and domestic adoption outreach and education fee
- 2. Birth parent services: charged on a time and expense basis to the adopting family
- 3. Supplemental Fee for Agency Services: provision of ongoing guidance and support for the entire adoption process; special programs, meetings, and support groups; additional guidance and support related to any unforeseen circumstances, such as, but not limited to: regulatory changes, unexpected delays, special investigations, program instability, or closures
- 4. Specific fee information and refundability/non-refundability are described in detail on the AAI Fee Schedules(s) and the Agency Policies

- 1. Michigan families who have an available home study or home study update completed within the last five years will be charged \$1,500 for a home study update when submitting a new application (\$500 due with application; \$1,000 due after home visit). In addition, attendance at an adoption awareness meeting may be required. If the last home study/home study update is five years old or older, a full adoptive home study is required. Home study updates for open case files will be charged \$750 if the most recent HS was completed by AAI and \$1,500 if the most recent HS was completed by another agency. A home study addendum with home visit will be charged \$450 and a home study addendum with no home visit will be charged \$150. (Extended travel fee of \$100 will apply for home visits if home is more than 50 miles from nearest AAI office.)
- 2. An initial escrow of \$10,000 is established at the time a family is linked with a birth mother. Adoption services and expenses are charged against that escrow. Additional escrow will be requested as the initial deposit is depleted.
  - Expenses include the hourly rate for agency services; mileage in connection with the adoption; actual birth parent living, medical, counseling, and legal expenses; and adoption related expenses as incurred. Expenses begin with the agency's first contact with the birth mother and/or adoptive family.
  - The adoptive family is responsible for birth parent expenses incurred throughout the entire pregnancy and up to six weeks after the birth.
  - Any and all attorney fees, including those incurred in the unlikely event of an appeal or any other legal action whenever filed, are the responsibility of the adoptive family.
  - Fees for services provided and expenses incurred are non-refundable if the adoption plan falls through.
- 3. Designated Adoption (including Returning Birth Mother placements): The Adoption Outreach and Education fee will be reduced by 50% for designated placements where a birth mother and adoptive family identify each other through a source other than AAI.
- 4. Should you have placement of more than one child and supervision visits are conducted at the same time, there will be a fee of \$100 per additional child, per visit.
- 5. Post Adoption Administrative Services include services provided on behalf of a birth parent and/or adoptive family after the placement is completed. Examples of such services are updating address and contact information, forwarding letters and packages, furnishing copies of reports/documents as requested, providing a meeting area for on-site adoptive family/birth mother visits, etc.
- 6. All fees payable to AAI are nonrefundable once they are paid.

- 7. It is expected that a home study through AAI will be completed within a three-month period. If circumstances may prevent completion within this time frame, you may be asked to withdraw your application or the home study may be denied.
- 8. Average adoption cost from January June 2020 was \$28,194. Fees ranged from \$22,160 \$35,395 based on actual time and expenses. This adoption cost is an average only and will vary from case to case. There is no guarantee that fees will fall within the stated range.
